





Rise of Anti-Asian Hate



- In the first four months of the pandemic, there were 145 reports to the NYC Commission on Human Rights of coronavirus-related Anti-Asian hate incidents. That's 12x the year before.
- Sharp increase in Anti-Asian hate crime arrests and complaints handled by NYPD.
- One third of Americans report they have witnessed individuals blaming Asians for the outbreak.






1/3 of Americans report they have witnessed **blame on Asians for the outbreak**

Types of Discrimination



Data from Stop AAPI Hate (March 19, 2020 to Dec. 31, 2020)


- Majority of incidents involve verbal harassment.
- Shunning, physical assault, and being coughed and spat on are also reported in alarming numbers.
- New York data shows a greater number of transportation-related incidents than other regions



Impact of Pandemic on Asian-Americans



• Asian-Americans represent 5.9% of the total U.S. population, but a **higher portion of essential healthcare workers** (in NY, 11.6%).



- The Asian American community has **higher-than-average business ownership**, some of which were the **earliest to experience declines** at the early onset of the pandemic.
- By mid-April, Asian Americans, who accounted for 9% of the state's labor force, had filed **14**% **of NY state's unemployment claims**.

Challenges



- 1. History of hate and violence in times of fear and uncertainty
- 2. Incomplete or inaccurate information about the pandemic
- 3. Underreporting of incidents
- 4. Reported incidents met with inaction; no consequences for perpetrators
- 5. Lack of Anti-Asian hate crime charges or prosecutions
- 6. Difficult legal standards
- 7. Social and political conflict among minority groups

Different Perspectives



- More government action
- More police attention, protection, and Asian hate crime task force
- Police reform; "defund the police" movement
- Tension between victim rights and criminal justice reform
- Cooperation and tension among minority groups



Seven Proposed Initiatives



- 1. Clear Reporting Mechanisms for Victims
- 2. Uniform and Consistent Classification and Prosecution of Hate Crimes by Law Enforcement
- 3. Greater Representation of Asians in Law Enforcement, Public Office, and the Courts
- 4. Public Education Campaign
- 5. Stronger Unity and Collaboration Among Minority Groups
- 6. Legislative Reform
- 7. Civil Actions
